
## **HISTORY OF THE TIME**

Rochfortbridge was a strongly Protestant village in the mid-nineteenth century.

A special feature of the Rochfort Bridge foundation was the opening of a 'deafmute' school in 1892 (special needs). In 1903 four Sisters learned sign language and worked in the school at crafts – knitting and lace making.

Between 1920 – 1940 the number of children diagnosed with this condition decreased and in 1940 the special school closed. Better facilities were available in Cabra, Dublin, and it was more central for people.

In 1896 the Community had increased to ten Sisters. In 1948 St. Joseph's Secondary School

commenced and in 1963 co-education was introduced. The community had increased to fifteen Sisters at this stage. All were involved in education, visitation and parish ministry. Sisters engaged in meeting the needs of the poor in collaboration with the St. Vincent de Paul Society.
